Participants will learn how to better support survivors of human trafficking as we move towards a better understanding of the population's needs.

August 21 12:00-1:00 p.m.	Obstetric and Gynecological Care, Including Sexual Dysfunction, in Female Trauma Survivors <i>Hajira Yasmin, MD, FACOG</i>	This webinar will discuss issues encountered in above stages of woman's life and bring awareness about trauma informed approach to be given to such survivors.
October 30 12:00-1:00 p.m.	Human Trafficking Awareness for the Healthcare Industry <i>Special Agent Jonathan Meyer, M.S.C.J.</i>	Human trafficking is the second largest global criminal enterprise. Studies indicate that the majority of human trafficking survivors interacted with a healthcare professional at one or more times during their victimization. This webinar will empower individuals to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understand the extent of human trafficking, both locally and globally. • Identify characteristics of sex trafficking and labor trafficking, the behaviors of traffickers and the impact on victims. • Recognize indicators of potential human trafficking victims, including indicators specific to healthcare settings. • Learn how and where to report suspected human trafficking to law enforcement, and how a reporter's actions and observations may benefit the victim in the subsequent investigation and prosecution of their trafficker.
